

The main aim of Horses in Drought Incorporated is to provide farmers with an alternative to euthanasing or selling horses, by giving them the opportunity to move horses to temporary homes with good pasture (kindly provided in good faith). They have also extended their aims to providing assistance with sourcing fodder. Horses in Drought would like all Australian Horse owners to know that they can help if they are in genuine strife. Horses in Drought promote responsible horse ownership and encourage owners to take action before it is too late. A nationwide battle to save the lives of horses affected by drought is growing at an alarming rate.

Volunteers from Horses In Drought Incorporated advise that there are thousands of horses affected by the drought. Some have already been put down by distressed owners who are unable to feed them.

President, Nicole Pearce said "over the past four years, volunteers all over Australia have offered to accommodate or feed starving horses at their own expense".

"Horses are relatively high maintenance and in these tough times, property owners were often forced to get rid of them before sheep and cattle."

Horses In Drought Incorporated has placed many horses in temporary homes and several feed stores and individuals have donated feed. The group is also involved in a number of fund raising initiatives with all proceeds going towards helping feed drought affected horses.

"Our major problem is finding transport for donated feed to where it is really needed," said Ms Pearce.

The Tick Line ...

Do you know where the Tick Line is? If you are planning to travel with your horse, make sure you know at what point(s) your horse needs to be inspected. There is a "Cattle Tick Protected Area" in Queensland WELL BEFORE the border. Your horse must be inspected/treated BEFORE entering this area – even if you aren't planning to cross into NSW (and you should be carrying a Waybill – talk to the DPI if you need to arrange one). You should make prior arrangements for inspection/treatment. Once your horse has been treated you will be issued with a permit – don't get caught without one!

Travel Report

Last issue we continued to share **Liz Siewert's** (Mount Bulla) travelling experience of last year. We covered day 2 and 3 of her 9 day float trip to Merrijig in Victoria. Below we have again published their itinerary – and a continuation of their travels

Their itinerary

Day 1 – El Questro/Kununurra (WA) to Katherine (NT)

Day 2 - Katherine to Tennant Creek (NT)

Day 3 - Tennant Creek to Alice Springs (NT)

Day 4 - Alice Springs to Coober Pedy (NT) Day 5 - Coober Pedy to Port Augusta (SA)

Day 6 - Port Augusta to Barossa Valley - Mt Crawford State Forest (SA)

Day 7 - Mt Crawford State Forest

Day 8 - Mt Crawford State Forest to Bendigo

Day 9 - Bendigo to Merrijig

Day 4, Wednesday 11th August - Alice Springs to Coober Pedy (NT) (690)

This leg is the longest so it is wise to leave early and there is not a lot of different scenery to keep you amused. The turnoff to Uluru and Kings Canyon is about 200kms south of Alice Springs - a not-to-be-missed side trip if you have time and are not travelling with horses. The turnoff is at Erldunda and the roadhouse is a good first stop to water the horses and stretch their legs although not a lot of grass around. From here you cross the border into South Australia.

Coober Pedy is the only place to stop with any sort of facilities. The landscape is really unique and you can stock up on provisions as well as see a few tourist attractions in the opal centre of Australia. We organised to stay at the Coober Pedy Race Course. They sometimes hold meetings so we were told to ring ahead to make sure there was nothing on at the time we were passing through. The contact I had was Ross Sawers (08) 8672 5579, (m) 0429 675 159, the president of the Turf Club (I think). Ross came out to meet us when we arrived and organised for the water to be turned on - water is at a premium here and basically the charges we were asked to pay are to pay for the water. I think it was around about \$20 each horse, and camping was free. There is no official camp area - we could roll out our swag wherever we pleased. There was a toilet, but no shower facilities. Of course, the horses could stay in the race yards which are a good size and safe.

Day 5, Thursday 12th August - Coober Pedy to Port Augusta (SA) (540)

Here is something to try - wake up at dawn and take the horses for a spin around the Coober Pedy race track. This is definitely the first time I have ever seen a race track made of rock. I think they only hold stock horse races now but I believe the meetings are very popular.

It's another day of desert views with hardly a roadhouse in sight, so make sure you have plenty of water and munchies on board for both human and horse. Between Coober Pedy and Woomera you are basically travelling through the Woomera Prohibited Area where entry is by permit only except in the immediate corridors of the Stuart Highway. At about the 300km mark from Coober Pedy, you start to see lots of salt lakes and hills. We found a great road stop at Lake Hart where you can unload the horses, cross the railway line (look out for long trains) and go for a ride on the salt lake. I have no idea whether we were allowed to do this or what the pitfalls are of riding a horse on the salt lakes, but we had fun.

Not very far down the road is Pimba Roadhouse, where you can get a cold drink and roadhouse food to carry you the last 170 odd kms to Port Augusta. This is also the turn off to Woomera and Roxby Downs and you can read up on the history nuclear testing that went on in the area years ago.

On the way to Port Augusta you get magnificent distant views of the Flinders Ranges and we couldn't help but wish we had a few extra days up our sleeves to do a spot of riding in there. We were very lucky at Port Augusta. When I was ringing the local council trying to find some contacts for the show grounds or race course, the helpful assistant gave me the number of the local animal officer. She knew of a friend of hers that used to have Show Jumpers and he had two stables free that we could use. So that's how we met Darren and he put us up for the night. If you are not as lucky as us, we were recommended to contact the local Port Augusta Pony Club. I do not know the contact phone number but it should be listed in the White Pages. If not, ring the local Port Augusta Town Council (08) 8641 9100 and see if they can help you. If you are looking for a Feed Merchant, try "Rural Fodder" on Footner Road (m) 0428 424 157, just on the east side of Port Augusta. He runs the business part time so you need to call before you get there. They sell excellent cereal hay and any other feed you are after.
